
Executive Director, Ryllis Percival introduced the members of the Board to the Membership following the election process. Each member

Derick 'Zeke' Boone Projects & Sites Manager Boone joined the team in February 2018.





Our Next National Hero?



In an era of reverse colonisation when Caribbean people were 'colonising' the domain of the colonisers. Connor could have left his native land and taken on the nationality of some distant country as many did during the 1950's and 60's; the emerging post-colonisation period in the Caribbean and the period immediately after World War II. Instead, he remained at home and established a Sunday school for what he described as "underprivileged, unwanted, despised, neglected and down trodden children of the village" where he was raised. This Sunday School would gain a solid footing and evolve giving Dr. William Connor, OBE birth to the Baptist Movement in the Federation and a beacon known as the Antioch Baptist Church, first established Baptist Church in the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis.

On Monday, 04 March, 1963, twenty-one Converts along with Bro Connor decided that they were ready for the waters of baptism. The following day, Tuesday 5th March, at 5:00 a.m., the Converts were baptised at Lime Kiln Beach. Despite adversity in the providence of God on that same day - 05 March 1963, Bro. Connor along with the converts came together with the assistance of Pastor Thompson and others of St. Thomas and started the Antioch Baptist Church of St. Kitts.

On Sunday 26 May, 1963, the first communion service was held. Twenty-four believers shared in the Lord's Supper at the unity Friendly Society Hall, locally called "the Black and White Hall". In the year following its formation, driven by a missionary spirit

and upon the invitation of

Ms. Marjorie Weeks, the Antioch Baptist Church started a new mission station in Lodge Village which has evolved into the Mt. Carmel Baptist Church.



In 1965 a mission was established in the holy ghost fire that had consumed St. Johnston Village and the surrounding areas was now spreading around the island. This time in the western direction. Information out of the village of St. Paul's had indicated

that a group of young men wearing black shirts and bearing the name 'Black Shirt Gang' was terrorising St. Paul's and organized into the Calvary Baptist Church in 1975.

For over a quarter of a century, Pastor William Connor dedicated his life to changing the landscape of the Federation while impacting many lives through the preaching and teaching of the word of God. As the Federation celebrates another National Hero's Day let us consider this dynamic, visionary, trailblazer, Rev. Dr. William Connor as one of the champions of the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis.

INDEPENDENCE SQUARE

Independence Square formerly Pall Mall Square, was renamed on September 19th 1983 to commemorate the birth of the new nation of St. Christopher and Nevis. It is located on the eastern side of Basseterre bordering Newtown. Its layout is designed to look like a Union Jack and the streets and houses surrounding it once date to the mid-eighteenth century. Unfortunately, time and environmental damage have destroyed many of them.

Fountain in the Square The Square The Square started its life as a pasture on the edge of town. A map by Peter Bour, a French Surveyor whom the British employed when the French lands were being sold, shows a pasture just east of Fort Street with houses only on its western side.

In 1750, a law was passed to build a court house in the Square and concerns were raised about some individuals who had started to encroach on it from the North, East and South sides of the pasture. The administration in St. Kitts felt it had every right to use it because of Mathew's declaration but Gilbert

Fleming, his fellow Commissioner and by then the head of Government objected. He reminded the Council and Assembly that all the French lands were deemed to be the private property of the King. He insisted that the Island Administration should either buy the land from His Majesty or ask his permission to build on it. Fleming even offered to pay for the land and donate it to the Administration which then objected that such a move would create obligations on its part. Despite this, Fleming went ahead and bought the land and when the Administration refused to deal with him, he sold it to Alexander Home in 1753 but then quickly bought it back in 1755.

Negotiations with the Council and Fleming to purchase the pasture and what it would be used for were concluded in 1758 when Fleming accepted the Council's offer of £1500 Sterling for the land. In 1792 the Government acquired a property called Tontine located on the South Eastern Side of the Square which soon became the administrative building housing the offices of the Registrar, the Secretary, the Courts, the Assembly and the Council. An Auction house was also located in one of the buildings around the square but its exact location remains to be discovered.

The Author of the West India Sketchbook talks of a slave market in the Square where slaves went to sell the produce they grew or things they made. It was a gathering place where slaves actually met to interact with each other, something they looked forward to so much that missionaries had a hard time calling them to church on Sunday which then was market day.

From time to time the square became a parade ground where the militia went through its drills.

In 1855 the Council decided to bring pipe-borne water from Olivees into Basseterre and a location on the land was identified for this project. The Sum of £50 was made available to the Commissioners for this project. When the project was completed, a stone fountain was built in the center of the square to commemorate this significant development.

In the 1880's the gardener for the Square was Abraham Brookes. Visitor's descriptions of it showed that it was flourishing into an attractive space that included some horticultural wonders. By this time the Square was lit at night by kerosene laps but these were replaced soon after electricity was introduced in 1928.

In 1953 L. R. Volonterio, Superintendent of Public Works did much to improve the look of the Square. The paths were embedded with concrete and surfaced with slabs. The small flower beds and short gravel walks which formerly encircled the fountain were replaced by larger beds intersected by paved walks designed by Volonterio himself.

Today the Square is the venue for many one-day cultural events.

From our Biodiversity World The Leatherback Sea Turtle (Dermochelys Coriacea)

Leatherback sea turtles are listed as vulnerable. They represent the largest extant reptile, with the largest animal recorded measuring 305 cm in total length and weighing 916 kg. They have the widest range of sea turtles and are highly migratory, with some animals traveling over 10,000 miles per year.

Female leatherbacks reach sexual maturity around 15 years of age and nest every 2 to 3 years. These turtles can lay between 5 and 12 nests in a reproductive year, with an average of 80 eggs per nest. Leatherbacks are unique in that they lay smaller infertile eggs atop the larger fertilized eggs before covering the nest.

The leatherback nesting season on St. Kitts runs from February through July, with hatchlings emerging through the end of September and beginning of October. Leatherbacks prefer the Atlantic side of the island for nesting, with Keys and North

Friars being the highest density nesting beaches on the island. Nesting does occur on the Caribbean side of the island, although not as frequently.

This leatherback sea turtle shell is a beautiful artifact which has been well preserved for future generations to appreciate here at our National Museum.


A Special Visit from "The Future Leaders Camp" of Central Basseterre!

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Independence Reflections



On Monday 19th September 1983, St. Kitts and Nevis attained independence from Great Britain to be-

come the newest independent nation.
